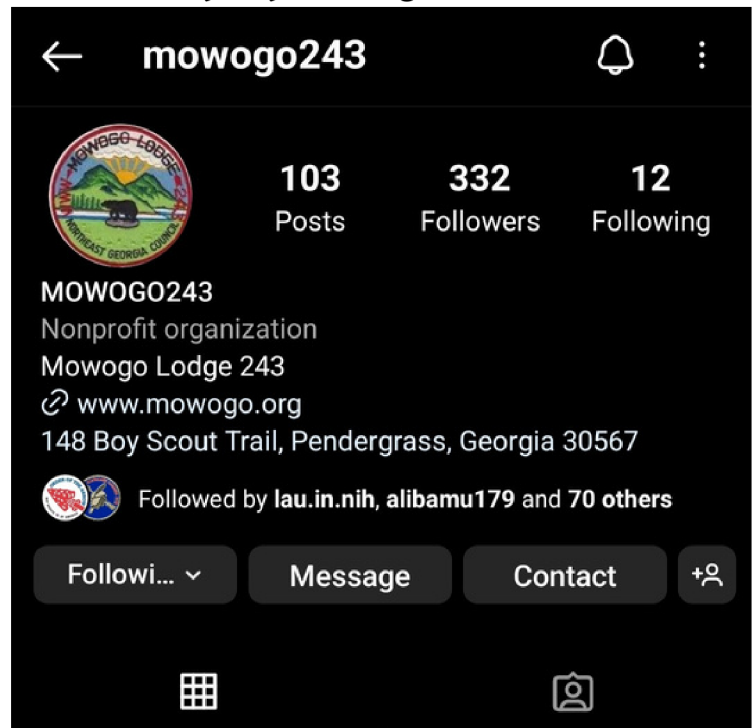

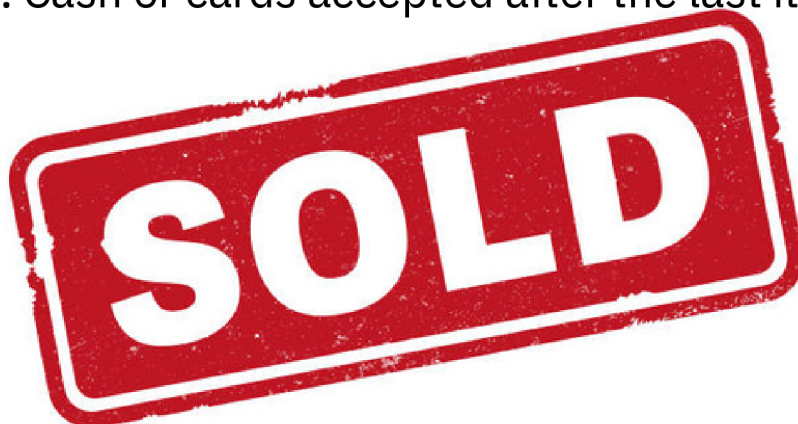


Patch Auctions

Max Sartain Broken Arrow Ceremony

Broken Arrow Ceremony for Brother Max Sartain

June 15, 1936 – February 3, 2023

Mowogo Lodge ❖ Northeast Georgia Council, BSA

Brother Max Sartain served Scouting as an adult for more than 60 years. He served as Scoutmaster for BSA Troop 152 sponsored by this church, Jones Chapel United Methodist Church, for more than 45 years. It is the role of Scoutmaster that is one that most directly impacts youth in the Boy Scouts of America program. Max had a number of Scouts that earned the Eagle Scout rank under his guidance. His son, Greg, was his first Eagle Scout. While Scoutmaster, Max completed many trainings as a Scout leader including Scouting's premiere adult leader training Wood Badge that was first developed by Lord Baden-Powell, the founder of the world Scouting movement. After stepping down as Scoutmaster, Max continued to serve youth in his community by serving on the Troop Committee of BSA Troop 70 in Franklin Springs, Georgia.

Max's service to the Scouting program expanded beyond his local community. He served as a member of the Properties Committee for the Northeast Georgia Council providing his expertise and service as a skilled mason and craftsman to keep our council camps and properties updated and well maintained. Max and his sons built the great chimney, fireplace and mantle in the 850-seat Dining Hall at Rainey Mountain where they placed a well disguised tribute to the Order of the Arrow that serves a point of reflection for all of our members, old and new, to think about what service to others means. Several years ago, Max and Ed Brown led the effort to reestablish a former campsite at Rainey Mountain that had been in disuse and had fallen into disrepair. In recognition of Max's service and leadership, the "Sartain" campsite was named for him and, since then, each year hundreds of Scouts and Scouters from Northeast Georgia and around the nation enjoy this space as they participate in their summer camp experience. Max and his son Greg also built the first shower house at our council property Scoutland on Lake Lanier.

The Order of the Arrow program of the Boy Scouts of America is Scouting's National Honor Society. Mowogo Lodge of the Northeast Georgia Council is the local Order of the Arrow affiliate. Max loved this part of the Scouting program and served the Northeast Georgia Council and its youth as a leader in the Order for many years. Among his many roles in Scouting, Max served several years as the adult Order of the Arrow Adviser for the former Broad River district in northeast Georgia while Scoutmaster. His dedication and leadership serving others was renown as evidenced by the distinguished recognitions he received. In 1984, Max was recognized with the Vigil Honor in Mowogo Lodge. Vigil Honor members are recognized by their selfless service and leadership and only 1 in 50 current members may be chosen each year. In 2002, in recognition of his continued dedication and service, Max was recognized with the

Founders Award which only two members from each Order of the Arrow Lodge may be chosen each year.

In addition to his recognitions in the Order of the Arrow, Max was recognized by the Northeast Georgia Council with the James E. West Fellowship award, the District Award of Merit, and the highest recognition a BSA council can bestow, the Silver Beaver Award.

Of all these recognitions, there are a couple that stand out to me as very representative of Max's spirit, his humor, his humility, and his love of simple pleasures. When someone is recognized with the Vigil Honor, a name is chosen for them from a native American language. Max was given the Delaware or Lenni-Lenape name "Woapink" which translates into English as "Opossum." When asked what his Vigil Honor name meant he would say with some excitement "O-possum" and then would follow immediately with: "found on road dead!"

I believe the most telling of the recognitions dedicated to Max is one that most people do not see as it is tucked into the wood line behind the waterfront program area at Rainey Mountain. Many of his friends and fellow adult members of the Order of the Arrow donated and built a very strong bridge over a creek that feeds the lake, the only bridge in camp with a cover. The bridge has a small plaque on it with his Vigil Honor name and leads to the Fishing merit badge shelter there at camp. Of all his lasting contributions to Scouting, our youth, and our properties, this bridge is a lasting tribute to his love of fishing, his love of the Order of the Arrow, and his love and belief in the Scouting program. But it is the strength of the bridge, the thoughtfulness behind its construction and existence, and the less than prominent location that symbolize the spirit that infected all of us that had the privilege to know and love him. Many will enjoy that bridge, the campsite, the masonry work in the dining hall and many other places he worked and the people he touched in his service and by his leadership.

Monday night I received an email from Scott Sorrells, the current National Commissioner of the Boy Scouts of America, when he had heard that Max had passed. He asked that I share this with you today:

"To my fellow Order of the Arrow Members of Mowogo Lodge, and friends of the Northeast Georgia Council. I was saddened to hear that Max Sartain has "gone home" as we say in the Scouting family. I am sorry that my Scouting travels will prevent me from joining you for the service. I can visualize the strong acknowledgement of his contribution to Mowogo and Scouting by the presence of so many Scouts and Scouters in uniform. It is an appropriate way to acknowledge a lifetime of cheerful service."

Spring Fellowship Dining Hall

March 17th – 19th, 2023

Mowogo Lodge Members will have the same experience Spring Fellowship, March 17th – 19th within the Dining Hall as last year's Pre-Camp and Pow Wow Fellowship's. No more waiting in line, everyone will still walk into the dining hall and take a seat, members serving themselves from serving dishes already placed on the table (aka FAMILY STYLE) and the ability for everyone to enjoy maybe a little more of what you like versus having a portion of something that you do not like.
