Hello everyone, I hope that you all are doing well!! If you are a youth and are interested in working in the trading post, please reach out and contact me.


Normal trading post hours: Saturday 2:00pm to 4:00pm 6:00pm to 7:30pm

The Silent Auction Starts at 11:30 a.m. in conjunction with lunch in the dining hall and ends promptly at 12:15. Scouting memorabilia will be arranged on tables and have paper bid sheets that include the item description and minimum bid with spaces for you to include your bid and name. You and others may bid and outbid each other until the auction ends. The high bidder should pay and pickup before work projects resume at 12:30.

The Live Auction should start at 9:30 p.m. during the cracker barrel. Scouting treasures will be previewed on the big screen. During this lively affair the auctioneer will solicit bids from you and your friends in a magical cadence. Cash or cards accepted after the last item sells.

The following is a continuation of our last article about the history of Area "A" (see Arrow Points Spring Fellowship 2022 Vol. 24, Is. 1.)

The Cleveland campsite was originally the Staff Area and served as such from the 1950's through most of the 1980's. Camp staff slept in tents and considered the addition of electricity in the 1960's as a huge improvement to their quality of life. Their original shower house was open to the sky and did not have individual stalls. When it rained, it was nearly impossible to walk up or down the mud hill leading to the site. Many former staffers recount tales of heading out to teach classes covered in mud.

The current Staff Area was opened in 1989 and the old Staff Area became known as Cleveland-Martin Campsite. For the previous 20-plus years Cleveland-Martin had been a tent campsite, up the hill near Alto. The Cleveland family of Gainesville made a significant contribution to the Capital Campaign that allowed our Council to rebuild the shower house. Being both centrally located and one of the first to have electricity, this new Cleveland-Martin became a cherished site throughout the 1990's

Think about this as you hike out toward the Lodge Ceremony Ring. Remember all the thousands of Scouts and Scouters who have camped in Area "A" over the years and consider how you are linked to that legacy.

The weeklong program will immerse museum professionals and volunteers in best practices for museum operations and artifact preservation.

Greetings Brothers,


