




Lodge Advisor Minute

As you know, Treasure Island is the birthplace of the Order of the Arrow. What you may not know is that the location of the summer camp at Treasure Island has been devastated by flooding over the years. The local council had to make a tough decision. A scout is Thrifty, and they could not justify spending any more money on the camp knowing that it was subject to future flooding. So, the hard decision was made to sell the property and with it, the original ceremonial grounds and council ring of the Order of the Arrow.

The week after Spring Fellowship a friend in this Lodge sent me a YouTube link to a clip of the Restoration Project where Arrowmen from Unami Lodge 1 and others carefully dismantled the ceremony ring for the purpose of moving it to The Summit in West Virginia. I encourage you to look it up and watch it. As I watched the clip I became very thoughtful of the history of the Order of the Arrow. I became so encouraged by the Spirit of Scouting which burns so bright in the hearts and minds of those volunteers and scouts. I was amazed at the effort and the tremendous undertaking and logistics which included pain staking details using helicopters to remove loads of stone to be placed on 18 wheeled trucks for shipping to the Summit. It made me ask myself, "Where did this idea come from and how did it keep going until this point? What motivated these men and scouts to accomplish this? How did this great feat become possible?"

As impressed as I was about this project, I became amazed at another fact. You see, over one hundred years ago, two young men in their early 20's had an idea. This idea was not one of a program to be hosted by a council. It was not motivated by money, or increasing numbers of participation. It was motivated by their love for fellow man and their hope for the future. What an awesome example that I hope we never lose sight of. These two young men saw the potential and importance of paying it forward and they gave full credit to their creator. They did not let the winds of discouragement extinguish that spark but instead allowed it to be fanned into a flame. Their intentions are marked by the eternal words of E. Urner Gooodman (one of our founders) who said this;

"The Order of the Arrow is a 'thing of the spirit' rather than of mechanics. Organization, operational procedure, and paraphernalia are necessary in any large and growing movement, but they are not what count in the end. The things of the spirit count: Brotherhood – in a day when there is too much hatred at home and abroad. Cheerfulness – in a day when the pessimists have the floor. Service – in a day when millions are interested only in getting or grasping rather than giving. These are of the spirit, blessed of God, the great Divine Spirit"

One hundred years ago, these men did not let their vision die in the idea phase. These men developed their idea, motivated by their Love for Others, into a plan. These men did not let their idea become extinguished in the planning phase. These men fanned their idea and their plan into an eternal flame which burns bright in the heart of those gathered this weekend here at Camp Rainey Mountain and likewise in the hearts of those who gather like us across the nation with similar purpose. These men followed through and executed the plan that had come from that idea. Then it occurred to me that these two men, a Camp Director and a Program Director at a local summer camp, had someone at some time invest emotional energy and time in their development. Someone was there to encourage them, to give them resources and to remove obstacles from their path. And before that - those men had others investing in them. And before them, yet another, and before them... and so on. Where it started, no one can trace.

It is hard to imagine the possibilities of the future without looking at the past for encouragement. But dwelling too much on the past is unwise. I wonder what the boys that we have lived with and advised in Scouting will accomplish. It is that wonderment that keeps me going. One thing that remains certain is that we can never do what we need to do, nor go where we need to go in this life, if we remain exactly where we are. The path that lays before us leads to unchartered territory – it is a frontier to be explored and developed and lived in. This is the great adventure to be lived, the spark to fan into a flame, which is motivated by our love for others.
