
### Presented by the Ani-Gatogewi Chapter



# Lodge Advisor Minute

Brothers,

Are you into cars? Me – I'm a Jeep guy. I absolutely love Jeeps – and I've owned quite a few over the years. I like them authentic and original – the way they were designed by their engineers. But I'll take them with aftermarket modifications if I must. One reason I love Jeeps is because of their history. They literally are battle proven (starting in World War II). That's not to say that today's military vehicles are less than Jeeps, but when you look at the HUMMV of today you can see the genetics of their great-grandfathers in them still to this day. Recently I saw a 1941 GP (old Army Jeep) which sold for \$45,000. Why would anyone pay that much for a 74 year old Jeep?

One thing I know about car manufacturers is that they try out their concept cars on some of the worst roads that they can find. And if they can't find ordinary roads that are bad enough, they build special tracks with ruts, bumps, and potholes that simulate the worst of conditions. That's how the original Jeep (known as the Bantam) got it's start — at the Aberdeen Proving Grounds.

It is not hard to imagine why car engineers do this. They want to find the weak spots so that they can fix them before the cars go to market. Fortunately, they don't have to start from scratch every time they design a new vehicle. Take today's military HUMMV for instance; it's engineers had over 40 years of war experience with the Jeep where they learned from mistakes, found weak spots, and found what worked and what didn't.

Did you know that scouting is sort of like a car manufacturer's proving ground? In scouting we put youth and adults into close quarters and then challenge them with camping, backpacking, and tasks more or less distasteful; basically throwing at them (in a test environment) just about every stressful opportunity to break. In this environment, the weak spots show through like a giant spotlight is shining upon them.

Fortunately, you scouts and scouters have some "old Jeeps" to serve as a guide and a model for the future. Yes we have new ideas and "technology" to apply to the new models that were not available 20 and 40 years ago, but at it's root, scouting is still the same – and so is human character. The basics are the same – it hasn't changed.
