Mowogo Project List

Along with online registration, the lodge website now has the Mowogo Project List, which provides the Project Admin Team and Camp Rangers with a tool to publish, assign, and track work projects within the council. Taking on ownership for camp work projects is a vital way that a Mowogo Lodge member can provide service to others and help keep our camps running. So, to that end this tool also provides a method for Lodge Members to request ownership for projects.

This help section is aimed at familiarizing you with the Project List tool and providing basic directions for navigating the projects list and submitting a request for project ownership.

To get started, you must first log in to the mowogo website using the login form on the left with the current member username and password. This web login information is contained in all of the Arrow Points newsletters, and is also available from your Chapter Chief or Chapter Advisor.

Summit Corps: The New River Experience

If you want to get involved this summer, here's a great opportunity we hope many Mowogo Lodge members will participate in. The National Order of the Arrow Committee has created Summit Corps as a hybrid of ArrowCorps5 and OA High Adventure programs. During July 2011, Summit Corps: The New River Experience will provide service to the New River Gorge National River in West Virginia. The focus of the project is to upgrade the trail bed of the Garden Grand Hike and Bike Trail, along with the removal of invasive species. The Garden Grand Hike and Bike Trail connects the New River Gorge National River to the Boy Scout's new high adventure base and home of future Jamborees - The Summit: The Bechtel Family National Reserve.

Lodge contingents have a choice of four sessions to attend: Session 1) July 3-9, Session 2) July 10 -16, Session 3) July 17-23, and Session 4) July 24-30. Similar to ArrowCorps5 and our High Adventure programs, the week will consist of service, fellowship, and recreation opportunities. Not only will you be working on our newest High Adventure Base but we will be part of the initial group to help prepare it for the 2013 National Jamboree. There are a limited number of spots available for this adventure, so if you are interested, fill out the Summit Corps Registration Form from the lodge website and join us in being a part of history!

Indian Summer

Here's an opportunity for Arrowmen across the country to participate in focus areas including American Indian material culture and OA Inductions and Ceremonies.
